### **New Road Progress**

riginally, we had not planned to rebuild the water tank. We were just going to hook in to the new water tank at the top of the hill that was already in the new road plans. However, because we are not quite ready with our road plans, we had to draw up new plans to replace the water tower by the boys' cabins.

The original road plan was to take out the first boy's

cabin, To-tah-kan, to allow for the wider road. We ended up taking out Miwok Cabin as well because the new water tank is lower and wider. It was tough to see those two cabins be demolished and I am sure many of you reading this article might have stayed in either one of those cabins. But we are excited about the future of Camp Wawona and how we can expand and improve our hospitality to our people.

Base for new water tank

The new water tank permit has been approved and the new equipment is being fabricated and will be completed the middle of May. It has been a real challenge getting everything ready for this new structure but God has blessed. Even though the original plans did not have this lower water tank, we needed to put it back so we could have water to upper camp until the other tank is built.

This new tank will help us with the new road as it will be able to help lower the gravity gradually of the water from the top to the bottom of the hill and with this new tank.

Another challenge that we had at camp and with the new road was all the trees that have died because of the drought. Besides the dead trees, we also had to cut down an additional one hundred and thirty one trees to be able to widen the roadway to the top.

The new road will be able to accommodate two car widths. Because of all the trees that have died in the Yosemite National Forest, there is a lot of trees in this area that no one wants. So, if you were at the Camp Wawona in the last year and a half and saw all the trees along the road and all over camp, they are now all gone and cleaned up. It looks amazing and we are excited about how great camp is looking.

We had some challenges with the engineering of the new road permit but we hope to apply for the road permit shortly. Once we get that, we will keep you updated with pictures. The price of the new road is about \$1,600,000, although the price can go up depending on what we find out with our permit. The new water tank is part of that expense. The new water tank cost about \$70,000. In December

of 2017, we did an appeal to our Camp Wawona donors and alumni and to all our churches in the Central California Conference. I am happy to report that we received over \$70k in that offering - enough to cover the replacement of the new water tank. We are so thankful to serve a God who provides!

We currently have about \$600,000 toward the new road. NOW the challenge ahead of us is to raise the additional \$1 Million. The road is truly the "artery of camp." We can't run the ministry without it. Would you consider making a monthly gift (no matter how big or small) to the Camp Wawona Road?
